Mobility 1 Short-term joint staff training events - Bulgaria

The first mobility of the project titled "Interactive holiday calendar in Europe" was organized and carried out by Bulgarian partners from 144 Secondary school in Sofia. The first day of the exchange, Monday, the twenty fourth of November was dedicated to introduction, knowing each other and talking generally about the project. The day started with a welcome speech of the headmistress Mrs Velichka Nikolova and Bulgarian organization team Snezhana Stancheva, Anka Petrova, Vanya Uzunova, Valentin Ivanov, Rositsa Atanasova.







Foreign guests were welcomed with short musical programme, which presented them 3 different styles of folklore singing and costumes from several Bulgarian areas. After that the teachers had a guided tour around the school. They were in all parts of the school and saw classes at working time. After that the meeting continued with presentations of schools, cities and countries of all six partners.

In the afternoon of the first day, the partners talked about the project and assigned the tasks, fixed the dates and the activities. The partners discussed and agreed upon the dates of the future project meetings. They are as follows:

- Poland from 22 to 28 March 2020;
- Portugal from 31May to 6 June.

As a final of the first day partners participated in a dancing workshop at the host school. On the second day there was a cultural visit to Sofia city center. We visited the Ethnographic museum where we saw many interesting artefacts from the past, listening a lecture. The partners also visited remarkable places in Sofia like: National Palace of Culture, Vitosha Boulevard, St. Nedelya Church, Church St. Petka, Largo Square, Statue of Sofia, Largo Square, Banya Bashi Mosque, Sofia Synagogue, Turkish Bath- Sofia Regional Museum, Mineral Water Springs, Russian Church, Aleksander Nevsky Cathedral.

The third day began with a short trip to small village called Baylovo. There the participants took part in a workshop, where they got the opportunity to experience several Bulgarian customs.

In the afternoon, all participants have met the mayor of Mladost Municipality. After that the teachers returned to the school and worked together preparing the relevant documents of the project. Several documents were signed, the certificates and the documents were handed out. Host participants organized a logo competition and all partners voted and selected the best logo of the project for official use. The chosen logo includes the project name on it and all flags of the participating countries. The evaluation of the project will be done by sending and completing it within one week, it means that the host should send the participants the evaluation form via emails and the dead line to complete and sand it back is 6th December.

Moreover, the partners decided on assigning tasks for the completion of the project. According to this:

- Bulgaria is responsible for preparing, organizing implementing the Facebook page and the deadline is 5.12.2019. All partners will contribute to it after that;
- Bulgaria is also responsible for registration of the project on eTwinning as soon as possible !;
- Bulgaria is responsible for collecting and presenting the results of the evaluation about the 1st mobility:
- All countries are responsible for preparing a presentation, containing an article about Meeting in Sofia (till the end of January) and disseminate the results of it in their schools;
- Poland is responsible for collecting these articles and with photos taken during the mobility will publish them in the newspaper;
- All countries are responsible for making 20 Xmas cards decorated with symbols of their traditional celebrations and customs. Each school should send at least 4 postcards to other partner countries till 6th December, so it should be possible for all the partners to organize the exhibition till the middle of the month. Then photos will be taken and uploaded on the eTwinning and Facebook pages.

For the next mobility in Poland we also decided that: Students should gather info about 2 or 3 (not more) spring holidays in their countries. They chose the most important ones and prepare a slide- show presentation. These presentations will be for the short-term exchange



of groups of pupils in Poland in March. They will be used for the final product of the project activities, Creating an interactive calendar of the traditional holidays of the participating countries. Students of Poland should create a video film about one traditional spring holiday of their country or reenactment of the chosen one.










KICK-OFF TRANSNATIONAL PARTNER MEETING Mobility to Bulgaria (24/11/2019 to 28/11/2019)



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The most popular traditional holiday in my country



The Rose Festival in Bulgaria is one of the most exciting festivals of the rose in the world. Thousands of visitors travel to the Rose Valley in Bulgaria to discover the hidden mystery behind the celebration of the rose. The festival includes authentic rituals and events such as rose-picking /harvesting ritual in the rose gardens/, a rose parade along the streets of the town, rose queen ceremony and kukeri showThe most important part of the holiday is the ritual "Rose picking and rosary". The rose pickers are dressed in folk costumess. Rose picking starts early in the morning and lasts until noon - the flowers should be fresh and not fully bloomed in order to preserve its aroma and humidity. The ritual continues with boiling of rose oil and tasting of freshly produced rose water, rose jam and gyul brandy. Next is the carnival procession, which is the largest street carnival in our country and after that a folklore performance and welcoming the newly elected Queen of Roses. Craftsmen and artists present works of folk crafts and applied art. i think that everyone who loves and respects the Bulgarian traditions should visit or take part in this beautiful holiday at least once in their life.

There are several types: coated with a hard candy shell in a variety of colours, coated in chocolate or coated in caramelized sugar.

their country's symbols and students had to preapre lapbooks as on offline activity. Polish team had to compare Polish and Romanian symbols. That was really learning experience.





Virtual mobility (14/3-18/3 2022)








FIRST VIRTUAL MOBILITY IN POLAND – TURKEY TEAM

On the first day of the mobility, our team visited the school, got to know the students and the school representatives. The very welcoming hosts offered the guests a traditional culinary delight.















After exploring the mountainous areas, the students made contact for the first time with the water of the Atlantic Ocean, visiting the port, all this leading to a state of joy and a unique experience.




I visited the Cathedral of Slobozia, the Ascension of the God, on the very day of the patron saint.

The programme was completed with the virtual mobility to Greece on 27-29 / 06/2022 successfully and properly organized by the host school with the excellent cooperation of all participants.







The last virtual mobility in Greece



VIRTUAL MOBILITY FOR TEACHERS IN GREECE - POLAND









Virtual mobility in Greeces 23-30 june 2022 in 1 DINOTIKO SXOLEO TRANDRAS THESSALONIKA
